- Small piece of felt for the horns

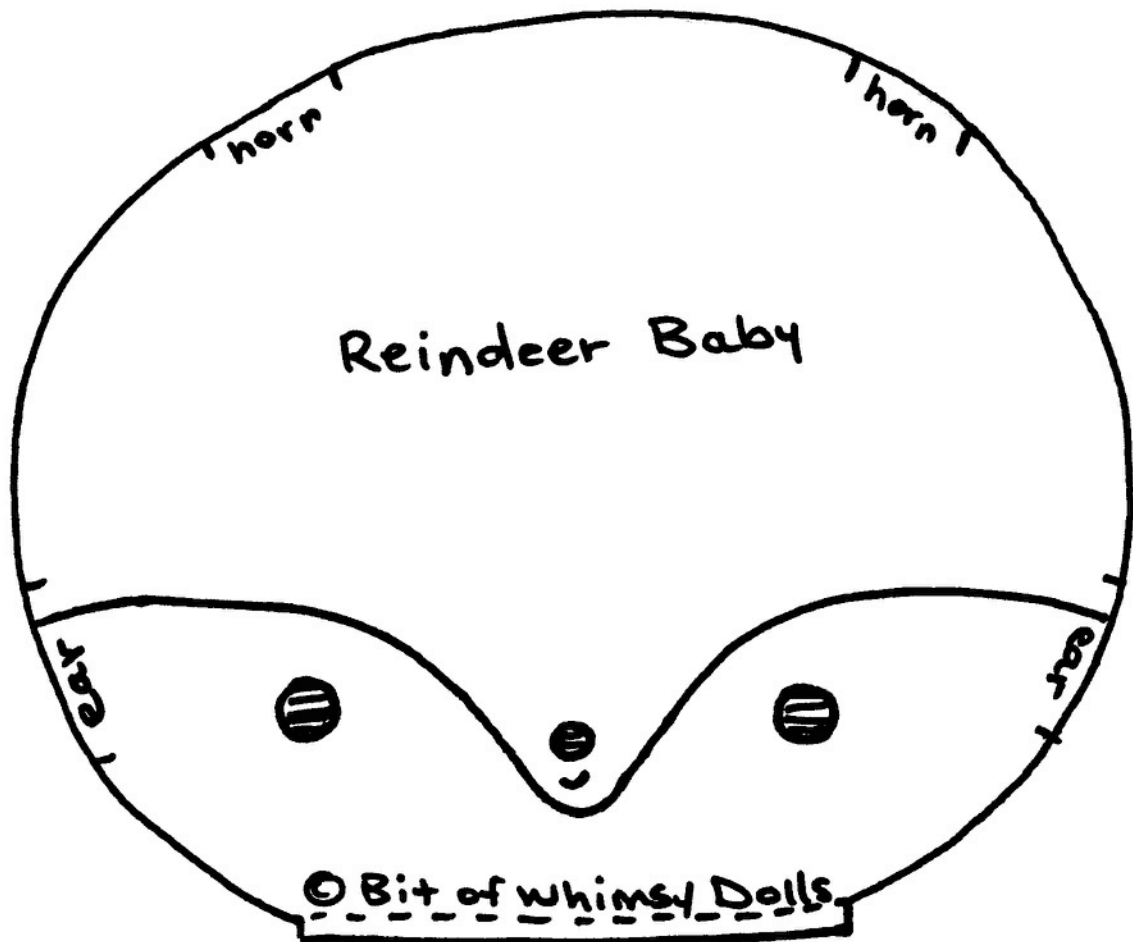


- Use the Fox Baby pattern to sew Reindeer Baby together.
